


# So...What should you expect in the exam?

- 1 poem from the cluster you have studied will be printed on the exam paper.

- You will need to compare the similarities and differences in the <u>content</u> and <u>style</u> of the poems and how they convey ideas about power and conflict.

# What is content and style?

 Content= The ideas and feelings in the poem. May include situations, people, places, thoughts, perspectives, contexts.

Style/ Method= How the poem is written. The choices in language and structure that a poet has made to express their ideas.

Techniques

This tells you which aspects of the content to look at.

• Compare the <u>ways</u> that poets present <u>attitudes to conflict</u> in <u>Charge</u> <u>of the Light Brigade</u> and <u>one other poem from the power and conflict</u> <u>cluster.</u>

The named poem will always be printed.

You will have to choose a suitable poem from the rest of the cluster.

Discuss with partner which one you would choose here then use the grid on the next slide to prepare some ideas.

Here is a typical exam question for this paper.

An easy way to compare the poems- USE SMILE. (structure, Meaning, Imagery, Language, Effects).

		Charge of the Light Brigade- Attitudes to conflict	Poem 2- Exposure- Attitudes to conflict.	Similarities	Differences
S	Structure	The repetition of the line 'rode the 600' emphasises how the soldiers were seen as one body and not individuals. They were dehumanised and even though they were brave they were not looked after by those in authority.			
M	Meaning / ideas	Those in authority risk the lives of others and do not take responsibility for their actions. Many men and horses die due to poor leadership.			
I	Imagery	Images of entrapment are used to convey how the soldiers were surrounded by the enemy; 'cannon to left''cannon to the right'			
L	Language techniques	The use of imperatives such as 'forward' conveys how these soldiers were simply taking orders and let to their deaths by those in power. The conflict /battle was doomed from the start.			
F	Effects on the reader	Shows us the reality and not the glory
